

Further, for better appreciation of the contribution made by classical legal personalities, their views regarding Law and Jurisprudence are enumerated in tabular form:-

Sl. No.	Person	Views regarding Law and Jurisprudence
1.	Montesquieu	Unless power is made to check power it will be abused— Doctrine of Separation of Power.
2.	Professor H.L.A. Hart	Some shared morality is essential to the existence of a society.
3.	Lord Brightman	Judicial review is consumed not with the decision but with the decision making process. Unless that restriction on the power of the Court is observed, the Court will in my view, under the guise of preventing the abuse of power, be itself guilty of usurping power.
4.	Dias	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A large number of murders may go undetected but is that an argument for abolishing the law against murder. Unenforceability is a matter of degree, and difficulty of enforcement, however great, should never be a ground <i>per se</i> for abolishing any law.</li> <li>• Sexual immorality stems from deep-seated drives which needs channeling, not punishment. One strives to cure disease not to punish sufferers.</li> <li>• Jurisprudence might well be described as the lifemanship of the Law. No one can be a good lawyer who only knows law.</li> </ul>
5.	Grotius	Natural law is 'right reason in agreement with nature'. Natural law is the principal foundation of International Law.
6.	Socrates	Man possesses faculty of 'insight into the nature of conduct' insight being the knowledge of goodness. This virtue is knowledge, and in this way he propounded a natural morality.
7.	Lord Actor	Power tends to corrupt and Absolute Power corrupts absolutely.
8.	Friedrich	Justice is never given, it is always a task to be achieved.
9.	Austin	Law is the command of sovereign backed by a sanction.
10.	Aristotle	Legislature makes citizens good by forming their habits.
11.	Holmes J.	The life of the Law has not been logic; it has been experience.
12.	Professor Maturana	Biological theory of "autopoiesis"— That no one can know what the world outside him or her really is for what each person knows is the response of his or her nervous system to external stimuli.
13.	Lord Macmillan	The lawyer's business is with words; they are raw material of his craft.
14.	Julius Stone	Describes Jurisprudence as the lawyer's extroversion. It is the lawyer's examination of the precepts, ideas and techniques of the law in light derived.
